This year in Comm 110, we all learned many things like what true communication really is, how to address people in a public setting, interpersonal communications, and now even small group communications. With every new chapter comes new information. For me, I knew the gist of what most things meant, I just didn't know there were actually terms for all the little details of communication. Such as: the rhetoric canons, logical fallacies, communication climates, empathy versus sympathy, and how to properly interact within a group setting. In my high school, we were a project-based learning atmosphere where we did a lot of projects and presented a lot of information.
